

lictor's mother had been in a V coma for several months. He was using his own money to pay for household expenses and take care of his disabled siblings, but he desperately needed access to his mother's accounts to help with

the bills. In addition, the doctors told Victor that his mother was not mentally competent and needed a legal guardian. Victor wasn't sure how to proceed, so he turned to legal aid for help.

Texas RioGrande Legal Aid (TRLA) helped Victor file the applications to be appointed his mother's permanent guardian, a process that allowed him to take care of both her and the rest of the family. Shortly after the filings, Victor's mother regained her health and her mental capacity. Victor then worked with TRLA to dismiss the applications and get his mother back home. Today, Victor's mother continues to be in good health.



Vietnam Veteran who was Aexposed to Agent Orange was suffering from prostate cancer. At the onset of his cancer, he was designated with a 100% service connected disability. However, after surgery resolved the medical issue,

he was dropped back to a 20% rating of disability by the VA. Sadly, the surgery, while eliminating the cancer, created many other medical disabilities for this client. Legal aid appealed the rating and after extensive review of his medical record, was able to get his rating up to 60%. Increasing his rating, allowed him to receive \$1026 monthly rather than the \$255 he received with the 20% rating. This increase aided him immensely in getting off the streets.
